FIRESIDE REFLECTIONS

from Pastor Ben

Imagine, if you will, a family road trip. At the beginning there is excitement at the start of a journey, perhaps, mixed with some anxiety about being prepared. "Did we remember to pack everything?" Then you settle in and enjoy the changing scenery, quality time together, maybe some car games. Then bodies start feeling stiff and restless. You feel cramped and irritable. And finally, you here, from the back seat, the four words that have become a staple of comedic relief: "Are we there yet?"

For me, February can feel like an "Are we there yet?" month. Winter has already been here for two months. The holiday magic of December and New Years is long past. Winter activities and joys have been experienced and, maybe, aren't as exciting as they were. March is only a month away, though who knows what March in Minnesota will bring any year, but we know there will be at least one more full month of winter with February. "Are we there yet?" Perhaps, this February brings with it other "Are we there yet?" feelings beyond the winter weather. The start of a new presidential administration, congress, and new local elected leaders all working to enact significant changes in different ways to the delight of some and the chagrin of others. The exhaustion of the balancing act between staying true to our ideological beliefs while also striving to bridge the divide. How much longer before we arrive at substantive, long lasting reformation together and for the good of all people and this world we call home? "Are we there yet?"

This February and always, know that you are not alone. We, your Bethel community, joins and surrounds you as we travel on this journey together, trusting that our Emmanuel, "God with us," Christ Jesus travels with us providing us the "car snacks" of grace we need for the coming miles.

BEFRIENDERS by Marci Groenewold

When was the last time you changed your mind about something? This is an interview question asked by Shawn Brook, President of Seed World Group. For him, compromise is required when teammates with different backgrounds and viewpoints, that don't even necessarily like each other, work together.

As Brooks points out, compromise is not a failure, but rather a way to understand another's viewpoint thus creating a path forward, and achieving a common goal. This requires the capacity to listen with understanding all the while reflecting on what you think you heard. This traditional communication technique ensures clarity and mutual trust.

Unfortunately, this conversational skill has been largely ignored as of late. Those who are unwilling to compromise their firm opinion don't realize it blinds them to the nuances of making things happen. By putting up communication walls to shield them from people and ideas they don't like leaves no room for real conversation.

According to Brooks, you can either be right or you can have things go well. By improving our ability to have meaningful two-way conversations, compromises to reach the finish line are a not failures. It takes wisdom, self-awareness, commitment and bravery to reach a compromise. Skills that can be used to talk **WITH** someone, not **AT** someone are essential.

Listening skills, like the ones described above are just one component of BeFriender Ministry training. Now, more than ever, people who long to be heard need people to just listen to them. BeFriender Ministry training is available to all Bethel members, regardless if you chose to become a BeFriender Minister or not.



Life Gets Better: The Unexpected Pleasures of Growing Older by Wendy Lustbader

It may seem too good to be true, but Wendy Lustbader is convinced that our later years are much better than those of our youth. As a social worker and university professor she shares from personal interviews evidence that being a teenager and young adult may not be the glory years after all. As our bodies age and our focus moves away from self and onto others there seems to be a newfound purpose for living. Lustbader says, "While self-interested pursuits tend to exhaust us over time, contributions to the lives of others tie us into reliable sources of energy. When we know we are making a difference in someone else's life, the body's humiliations matter much less."

The beauty of this book is that even if you only read the introduction or a few chapters, you can find great hope and understanding for the future. Don't miss the chapters on self-knowledge, relationships, generosity, and the passage of time. The last third of the book focuses on the last third of life,

when we reflect on how we grew when we were young and during midlife. As we age we may decide to let go of old hurts, find new empathy and build relationships that we were previously not able to see as possible.

RIC CELEBRATION SUNDAY ON FEBRUARY 9



A PASTORAL MESSAGE FROM ELCA REGION 3 BISHOPS from January 28, 2025

Jesus said, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." Luke 10:27

As ELCA bishops in Minnesota, North Dakota, and South Dakota we serve in contexts that stretch from the badlands to the prairies, from fertile farmlands and forests to urban centers. Though the contexts are diverse, God's mandates for how we are to live are the same.

In recent days, the heightened rhetoric of violence and newly enacted Executive Orders compel us to remind people of faith of God's fundamental blessing of all human life. In the language of the Bible, we say that all people are made in the image of God. Every person - without exception - has inherent dignity and value because all people are made in God's own image. Human dignity and value come from God. People of faith throughout our region, and indeed this world, are compelled to speak and act toward others in ways that honor the image in which we all are made. All people and groups deserve to be treated with dignity and respect in our common speech and in our public and private interactions. If we wonder what such dignity and respect look like, Jesus made it simple with a teaching known as "the Golden Rule," "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." (Matthew 7:12)

The apostle Paul wrote in the book of Galatians, "the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." (Galatians 5:22-23) These are the traits that guide our interactions with all our neighbors and inform our conduct in daily life. These are the characteristics that embolden us even as we work for justice and peace.

Across this region we are grateful for the many people of good will who are working to increase dialogue, seek the common good, and treat our neighbors, near and far, as those who bear the image of God. We are with you in prayer as, together, we seek to live lives worthy of this ancient admonition from God's word, "You shall not take vengeance or bear a grudge against any of your people, but you shall love your neighbor as yourself: I am the LORD." (Leviticus 19:18)

Thank you to all who contributed financially to our successful year. We ended the year with a small deficit of \$145.

You will recall that our budget was \$969,250 so both revenue and expenses were under budget by \$21K. While we try to be as conservative as possible, we also want to grow our ministry. We want our pastors, staff, and committees to explore new programs, reach out to the community, and to try new ways for us to learn. Often there is expense associated with these activities. CAC Crisis Housing
